
Dear Editor,


Which music streaming platform do you use the most?


Which career in the music industry would most interest you?


Which 20th century decade had the best music?


Which unusual musical instrument would you want to learn?


What is your favorite type of international music?

The Sweatshop in Your Closet: Exploring the Ethics of Clothing Article and Photo By Raneem Abu-Ramadan

Do I know how my outfit was made? The answer would be no, no I do not. Do you? You may be wondering why I'm asking this question, covering the topic of "ethics of clothing".

The Oxford Dictionary describes modern memes as "a humorous image, video, piece of text, etc., that is copied (often with slight variations) and spread rapidly by internet users."

The origin of the word "meme" can be traced back to a book called, *The Selfish Gene*, written in 1976 by a man named Richard Dawkins. He used the word to describe "self-reproducing ideas" that spread from one individual to another. Traditional examples of historic memes on a larger scale include religions, cultures, and ideologies.

Memes are very accessible, you just need to open up a browser on a phone, computer, or even


Some memes have a positive effect on the world. One of these memes is #TEAMTREES. Team Trees was a

Team Trees eventually became a meme, which brought it even more attention and snowballed into the fundraiser earning more than 23 million dollars by December 26, 2019.

He was disrupted from his dreams by his servant Charlie, worried for his master's safety, he called out for him "Master Klyde? Are you alright?"



Klyde looked at the child and decided to dub her Khloe for she was beautiful.


